Lou is also a People and Development Consultant at Atkinson HR with specific interest in EDI and organisational culture.



Making Sense of Allyship

Vega, who lectures on the PGCE course at the University of Cumbria, has over 20 years' experience working in the arts, art education, art practice. She is particularly interested in how to grow the ecology of rural arts, working with schools, communities and local and national arts organisations. Her art practice involves printmaking, using the medium to subvert norms about value and inviting her audiences to play and reflect.
